ANNUAL REPORTS 2023-2024

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

I want to thank all of you who have volunteered your time for our club. We did so many wonderful things this past year. For me the most important first step was getting us all to meet "**in-person**" once again. And this...we did!

Some of the feedback that I received this past year was that members want to know more about what we have done, particularly with our involvement with Community outreach so I am including much of what we have accomplished since last June. You will find more details in each of the Committee reports.

We had fantastic programs put together by our past and current Program Committees spanning so many different topics organized under the leadership of Program Chairs, Sally Set, KK Zutter and now Kendra MacLeod. During the winter months, we were able to expand the ability for each of you to attend our business meetings followed by our monthly programs by offering hybrid meetings. This couldn't have been done without the support of Mary Talbot, Virtual Communications Chair and Berkshire Botanical Garden's staff. We had programs about growing peonies, birds of the Berkshires, and forest resiliency. We started off in January with Anthony Archer-Wills who dazzled us by showing us many of his designs of naturalistic water gardens. In February, Jane Winn of Berkshire Environmental Action Team (BEAT) shared with us what her organization is doing to help combat pollution and climate change. We learned about light pollution from Jane Slade. In May, David O'Neill, director of Mass Audubon gave us a free program at Pleasant Valley Wildlife Sanctuary (PVWS) about climate change and habitat loss. Afterward, many members went to see the boardwalk that was rebuilt following the microburst storm with the help of funding received from the Garden Club of America's (GCA) Restoration Initiative Grant (RIG).

We had many very popular social gatherings. And yes indeed we did socialize! We began last June on the porch at the Lenox Club for Part 2 of the AM, the next month following our Program on how to document a garden, we gathered for lunch at the home of Deb and Paul Deres and strolled through Shaker Ridge Woodlands most recently documented by for the Smithsonian Archives of American Gardens, visited private gardens in Claverack followed by a social gathering at Art Omi arranged by Kim Crocker, Chair of Visiting Gardens, and her committee. In July, Megan Schwarzkopf, Horticulture (Hort) Chair organized a propagation workshop at her Bennington, Vermont home for the Hort Committee to propagate plants for the Shirley Meneice Horticulture Conference (SMHC) Plant Exchange (PX). Some of these social gatherings even included Carolyn King's spontaneous "pop up" invitation to see her gardens. In September, members of the Conservation Committee visited the Berkshire County Jail & House of Correction to see the incredibly impressive greenhouses where they grow mostly lettuce using hydroponic technology. Can you imagine us there? It was very impressive! In December, we ended 2022 on a high note at our Holiday Tea graciously hosted by member Mary Manning and arranged by Vaunie Graulty and her committee. In March. Nancy Hickey and her crew brought back our French Gardener's Breakfast at Mary Stokes Waller's Orleton Farm. Mary generously hosted us at her newly renovated venue. And Cathie Kavanaugh not only catered for the breakfast (with help), she also donated the food for it. And nothing could have topped it off better than a walk through LGC history organized by Debbie Smith and the display done by her and Paula Gimblette.

In April Flower Show chair Diana French's hope of returning to an inperson Daffodil Show was fulfilled. Diana and her team put together a fabulous Flower Show, Daffodil Derby, for us where daffodils were displayed individually as Hort entries, in floral designs, and in photographs. Well! Talking about socializing, the night before the Flower Show we gathered at Ginger Schwarz's home for cocktails and hors d'oeuvres, which were generously donated by her and her helpers. Let's keep these wonderful events going throughout next year!

Now, what did we do for community outreach? Well, we did a lot! Many of you are aware of our activities that you were involved in but if you weren't you may not know about all that we have done.

- We received a **\$3,000 grant** from the GCA written by Barb May and Paula Gimblette to continue to support habitat restoration efforts along the Sackett brook riverbank at **Canoe Meadows** in Pittsfield in partnership with Mass Audubon West.
- We also received another **\$10,000 Restoration Initiative Grant** from the GCA written by Deb Deres, Pamela Sandstrom and PVWS staff to help rebuild PVWS's boardwalk and to educate our community about the impacts of our changing weather patterns.
- We gave another **\$500 to BBG** for a campership in honor of late LGC past president, Ellen Greendale.
- Last summer the **Pollinator Pathway Project** Committee led by Loretta Scheel established a pollinator garden in Stockbridge at the First Congregational Church and added

pollinator plants at the Stockbridge Library Garden with around **\$1000** of funds from our Community Account.

- We gave out our **first LGC Scholarship of \$500** last summer **to Abigail Webster.** Thanks to the generosity of MaryEllen O'Brien who underwrote this grant.
- In August, we supported the BBG Grow Show with many volunteers and entries in both Horticulture and Floral Design. Additionally, several of our members served on the leadership team and others supported the Judging Panel in various roles under the leadership of Co-Chairs KK Zutter and Martha Piper.
- In the fall, we **"womaned"** Accessorize at the BBG Harvest Festival under the leadership of Nancy Hickey and new member Cynthia Tindale selling **\$6600** worth of accessories.
- In December, we also solicited and contributed **\$700** in donations for the **Elizabeth Freeman Center** for abused and battered women. We can't say enough about this wonderful organization that provides a safe haven for women and hope to contribute to this organization again next year.
- Two grants were approved by our membership to be given out for tree plantings. One to **Trinity Church for \$2,500** and the other to the **George B. Crane Center for \$1,000** that will be given latter in the fall.
- In March, Jeanne Davidson, Liz Murray, Margot Towl, MaryEllen O'Brien, and Jane Shea organized a **food drive** collecting money and items to be **donated to the Lee Food Pantry**. Over **\$2,000** was collected from LGC members along with 2 carloads of pantry items.
- In April, Lenore Sundberg and members of the Conservation Committee along with Mass Audubon West organized an educational workshop day at PVWS for LGC members as well as members of our community.
- As a continuation of our LGC focus on **food insecurity**, Kendra MacLeod organized members to participate in a **workday** of planting at **Gideon's Garden**. Gideon's Garden is a nonprofit that donates 100% of their harvest to local food pantries and works with middle-school children to give them exposure to farming.
- We also gave the **Town of Lenox close to \$1,300** to help maintain Lilac Park.
- Kendra MacLeod and her Fundraising Committee along with Classical Excursions arranged a phenomenal Fundraising Trip to Northern Ireland raising thousands of dollars for our community budget for next year.

A few other important things that you should know about are that our club supported the GCA Shirley Meneice Horticulture Conference which took place at different locations in the Boston area in September 2022. Stephanie Bradford and Loretta Scheel were co-chairs for badges. Deb Deres organized and ran the Plant Exchange. There were several other LGC volunteers who helped us with these efforts: Carolyn King, Ginger Schwarz, and Kathy Tremblay. Lenore Sundberg attended as our LGC delegate. At this GCA conference our Hort Chair, Megan Schwarzkopf's nomination for the prestigious Freeman Medal Plant of the Year received the Honorable Mention Award. In May, Megan attended the GCA Annual Meeting as the LGC delegate and shared with the Club her experience as did Lenore Sundberg with her experience from attending the SMHC. Both of our delegates have and will continue to share and enrich our club with information that they learned.

In February, Deb Deres was tasked by the LCG executive committee to reach out to a strategic planning expert to advise the LGC on developing a Strategic Plan. She contacted Debbie Edwards, a past GCA president with professional strategic planning expertise who developed the latest Strategic Plan for the GCA. We are so fortunate that she has agreed to advise our club. She agreed to do this at no charge to us. Being able to connect with her is a benefit of being a club member of the GCA and something that is worth thousands of dollars in savings for our club. Debbie told me that she is not doing this for the GCA but as an individual with many years of experience in strategic planning and with garden clubs because she wants to help us. The Strategic Planning Committee was formed the same month and is being led by Pam Johnson. In March under Pam's leadership, our club embarked on developing a Strategic Plan where each one of you will be involved to help to shape the future of the Lenox Garden Club.

Once again Gloria McMahon led the effort to decorate The Mount. Many of us volunteered and enjoyed ourselves developing further bonds with members. An invitation was extended to attend Lightwoods for free one night in December to those who helped decorate The Mount. Also, in exchange for this The Mount provides us with a free event.

And Janet Pumphrey's exquisite photographs were chosen not once but twice for the cover of for the GCA eNEWS publication. The extraordinary talent among our members is so remarkable!

Thanks to Mary Talbot and the Communications Committee we were kept well informed of happenings in our club through our monthly communication At-A-Glance and e-mail blasts. I especially want to acknowledge and thank Angela Cason for developing and getting out At-A-Glance every month.

As you can see, we have had an enormous number of very laudable activities this past year and so many more are not mentioned in this report.

I am so proud of all of you and want to thank you for your continued dedication, efforts, and commitment to our club. I look forward with great anticipation to we will be able to achieve in our next 12 months together.

CONSERVATION

In September, our large committee of 18 members met to brainstorm and discuss our top concerns regarding the environment. Ideas included invasive plants, native plants, plastic pollution, roadside litter, recycling, composting, and environment-friendly legislative initiatives. We shared ways that we were individually trying to reduce our use of plastics, our efforts to recycle, compost, etc., and decided to survey the whole club for input. Based on the data collected, we have created a Reduce/Reuse/Recycle Resource Guide which will be printed and also made available online for use by all LGC members.

In light of these environmental priorities, we invited Jane Winn, founding director of the Berkshire Environmental Action Team (BEAT), to be our Conservation Program speaker for the February 2023 membership meeting. Her inspiring talk, "How to BEAT Pollution and the Climate Crisis", highlighted some of BEAT's many projects that aim to protect and improve our local environment. All LGC members were encouraged

to sign up to receive BEAT's free weekly e-newsletter to keep informed about environmental issues.

In April, we co-organized with Mass Audubon staff an educational workshop (indoor talk and outdoor walk) on Forest Resilience and Climate-Smart Stewardship at Pleasant Valley Wildlife Sanctuary in Lenox. Our presenters were two Mass Audubon scientists and attendees included LGC members as well as members of local environmental organizations invited to participate. Our committee provided refreshments for both the morning and afternoon workshop sessions. This was the culminating educational event for the \$10,000 GCA Restoration Initiative Grant that was awarded to Pleasant Valley in 2022 to help rebuild the boardwalk destroyed during a severe microburst storm in July 2021. We will submit a final report for this GCA grant along with photographs to be posted on the GCA website.

In conjunction with the GCA effort to designate April as Native Plant Month in all 50 States, we wrote a Press Release highlighting four public native plant pollinator gardens that LGC created over the past several years. Also accomplished (via persistent phone calls to Lenox town officials) – the removal of litter along Lenox Mountain Road. We are so thankful.

Finally, I would be remiss not to mention a memorable field trip organized by one of our committee members last September – a guided tour of the aquaponic greenhouse at the Berkshire County Jail & House of Correction in Pittsfield. We were all amazed at the beautiful heads of lettuce produced there using water enriched with the waste of tilapia fish living in tanks in the greenhouse! Prisoners work with jail staff to grow the lettuce which is distributed to food pantries throughout the county all year long and also used in meals at the jail. We all were impressed and inspired – food for thought for sure.

Carolyn King won The Beinecke Bell Award given to the blue ribbon winner deemed to be Best in Show and judged to be the finest in the Horticulture Division. Donated by the LGC in honor of Carrie Beineke.

Kathy Tremblay won The Sweepstakes Award given to the entrant who accumulates the greatest number of Blue Ribbons in the Horticulture Division.

We prepared seed packages to share at the Shirley Meneice Horticulture Conference in Boston in September in addition to the two PX plants, *Itea virginica*, which were the result of the propagation workshop in July. Our plants were small but mighty. Deb Deres was responsible for managing the distribution of the Seed Share. Megan's LGC nomination of *Lindera benzoin* won an honorable mention for the GCA Freeman Medal awarded at the SMHC.

In October the Committee met at BBG to discuss more plans. We shared seeds that Lenore Sundberg, our SMHC delegate, and Megan collected at the SMHC, as well as members' assorted seeds. Stephanie Bradford and Anna Smith talked about resubmitting Joe Pye for the GCA Freeman Medal. Megan also has a submission. Those are due at the end of May 2023.

In January, I shared instructions for "Snow Sowing."

The GCA launched a nationwide, multidisciplinary, cross-committee collaboration to promote native plants by formally establishing a Native Plant Month in almost all fifty states. Using a proclamation, GCA club members across the country worked to formally establish a Native Plant Month within their state for April 2023. Massachusetts' proclamation was successfully passed, and several of the club's conservation projects align with the same native focus. At our club Annual Meeting 2023, native seeds and plants will be shared, in addition to other garden favorites.

In March, members were given directions on forcing winter branches to welcome Spring a little early.

For the LGC Annual Meeting in June 2023, we are bringing back the Plant Exchange with a Seed Share as well.

PROJECTS REVIEW

The Projects Review Committee is happy to report that we will fund two projects that went through the application process and were presented, discussed and voted on at an Executive Committee and membership meeting this winter.

Our projects for the Fall 2022-Spring 2023 Projects Review cycle are as follows:

An award to the George B. Crane Memorial Center. A Community Grant for \$1,000 for the planting of a tree at their Linden Street location. The GCMC was "established in 2010 to provide a welcoming, comfortable, substance-free place for peer-to-peer recovery groups to meet and help one another." The tree project, slated to begin this fall, will beautify the building in the West side of Pittsfield.

An award to Trinity Church. A Community Grant for \$2,500 for the planting of 3-4 trees as part of a much larger landscape/hardscape plan. This project is supported by the congregation and integrates into the town of Lenox walking plan. Our support is in line with previous collaboration efforts of an *Acer* tree planting by the LGC.

Continued effort to get the word out and increase application numbers is an ongoing effort. Application numbers increased from the previous year.
